

## Virtual Student Engagement Activities

Even when delivering instruction remotely, educators shouldn't have to sacrifice tried-and-true teaching and learning best practices. When considering implementing a Writing Lesson remotely, **it's important to build in opportunities for students to engage, collaborate, and discuss.** Therefore, we've compiled a list of ThinkCERCA's favorite engagement activities, broken down by steps of the writing lesson.

Keep in mind that collaboration does not have to be real-time; **forums, chat, email, and the telephone are all great tools to leverage** to encourage students to work together.

In addition to these activities, **encourage students to meet with one another virtually throughout a writing lesson**. For example, students can share their claims and reasons with a peer and provide each other with meaningful feedback. After working with a partner, students can summarize the call with their teacher or post to an online discussion board.
