Frayer Model

Building word knowledge and conceptual understanding using key vocabulary

Suggested Time: 15 minutes

Rationale/Research Base

Exploring key concept words related to the reading helps students deepen conceptual understanding and build vocabulary to make meaning and express their reasoning.

Optimal Application Notes:

Identify no more than 2-3 essential terms for Frayer Model notes. Have small groups or individuals own a single term and later join small groups in a jigsaw to share learnings.

Before:

- Decide if you will assign students a word or if students will choose a word to apply to the Frayer Model notes tool.
- Identify and provide resources for students to gather the necessary information to successfully complete the Frayer Model (dictionary, online resources, etc.)

During:

- Explain that keywords in the text will be important as students read, discuss, and write about the unit or lesson.
- Demonstrate the process of a Frayer Model (if new to students), including what makes an effective non-example.
- Provide students with a Frayer Model template.
- Ask students to complete the graphic organizer.
- Students can work alone, in pairs, or in small groups.
- Circulate to ensure that students are comfortable with the task and that all students get started and persist in completing the task.

After:

- (Today) Have student groups share out their models as you facilitate large group discussion, adding new ideas and concepts to their models and save for reference..
- (Today and Tomorrow) Post large Frayer Models of these key terms in classroom space for continual reference & modification throughout the unit of study.

Scaffolds & Supports:


- Have students draw or find mnemonic devices to remember new terms or concepts.
- Give sentence frames for using the words in context.
- Provide students with bilingual glossaries, alternate versions of the task, options for recording responses, etc.
